## PETER WEISEL

Doing something good with my comrades simply makes me feel good. I don't expect any thanks for that," says Peter Weisel. He ioined the volunteer fire brigade in his local community at the young age of 14 – completely on his own initiative: "My father wasn't a member of any brigade but even as a child I was interested in becoming one." Today he is Deputy Commander of the Surheim Fire Brigade, which has 55 active members.

Weisel was trained in the use of difficult respirators over many years, and today he shares his knowledge and long-standing experience. "Youth work is particularly important for me, so that the fire brigade also operates well tomorrow and the day after."

The Surheim Fire Brigade is called into action about 80 to 100 times a year - from fires to assistance after bad weather to road traffic accidents. One of Weisel's most enduring memories is that of a flood in 2013, when a whole district was inundated in the nearby town of Freilassing. "It was very demanding for all of us."

The experienced Assembly Manager devotes up to ten hours a week to his voluntary work. This is only possible because his employer offers the necessary support. "The company is always very accommodating in releasing me for missions, even during the day. One-week training courses are no problem either." Peter Weisel is not the only one to whom this applies. Almost 30 Kiefel employees are members of volunteer fire brigades. The company also benefits from their training. "The work in a well-functioning organisation and the ability to find and implement unconventional solutions are the hallmark of a good firefighter," says Weisel. And he can use this every day in his job as well.
