

My role is that of a connecting link between school management and parents," says Susanne Mendel. She has been on the parents' council at Schloßberg Primary School in the community of Stephanskirchen, where 180 girls and boys are educated, for six years now and has since become the council chairwoman. When her older son. Jakob. started school, there was no doubt for the dedicated mother that she would become involved in this council, "After all, it's a matter of our children's future." And she wants to remain part of the ten-person parents' council until her second son. Xaver, leaves the school.

Alongside regular meetings with mothers, fathers and teachers. Susanne Mendel also works on specific projects. In one of them, the parents' council created a way-to-school plan: "Our school is located in a difficult position in terms of traffic. We identified all the critical points within a one-kilometre radius and marked them on a map, so that parents and children know where they need to take particular care. In on-site inspections, we cooperate with local authorities and police representatives in considering how we can make these places safer."

Self-protection of the children is also important to the council: "We work together with a martial arts school on this matter. The children receive regular training in how to behave with strangers and what they should do if someone grabs them."
